Christ Our Life: United to Christ 20 21 What do you learn about unity from the parable of the vine and the branch? 22 \*John 15:1 "I am the true vine, and my Father is the husbandman. 2 23 24 Every branch in me that beareth not fruit he taketh away: and every 25 branch that beareth fruit, he purgeth it, that it may bring forth more 26 fruit. 3 Now ye are clean through the word which I have spoken 27 unto you. 4 Abide in me, and I in you. As the branch cannot bear fruit of itself, except it abide in the vine; no more can ye, except ye 28 29 abide in me. 5 I am the vine, ye are the branches: He that abideth in me, and I in him, the same bringeth forth much fruit: for without me 30 ye can do nothing." 31 32 \*2 Cor. 5:17 "Therefore, if anyone is in Christ, he is a new creation; old things have passed away; behold all things have become new." 33 34 Here are some of the lessons taught by the parable of the vine and 35 the branch: 36

- 37 •Branches must be vitally connected to the vine (Members must be
- 38 vitally connected to Christ).
- 39 •Connected branches experience ongoing pruning to maximize their
- 40 fruit-bearing ability (Members are pruned on an ongoing basis to
- 41 maximize their fruit-bearing ability).
- 42 •Branches not connected to the vine wither and are eventually cut
- 43 away (Members who are fail to connect to Christ wither spiritually
- 44 and are eventually cut away).
- 45 •Branches have a common source of nourishment (Christ is the
- 46 common source of spiritual nourishment for the members).
- 47 •Branches produce the fruit of the vine —Concorde vines produce
- 48 Concorde grape-producing branches (Members produce the fruits of
- 49 the spirit and have characters like Jesus. Meekness, for example, is
- one of the key proofs of being a connected branch).
- •Oneness with the other branches is ongoing as a result of their
- 52 connection to the vine stock (Members are in oneness to each other
- 53 by virtue of their connection to Christ).
- •Common sap from the vine brings unity in spite of diversity to the
- 55 branches (Common spiritual life from Christ brings unity in spite of
- 56 diversity to the members).
- •Branches retain their individuality though they are connected to the
- 58 vine (Members retain their individuality though they are connected
- 59 to the parent stock).

- 61 This chapter [John 15] is very simple in its illustrations, and every
- one should seek to understand its lessons. They should bear in mind
- 63 that the branches in the true Vine are the believers who are
- 64 brought into oneness by being connected with the Vinestock.
- 65 There must be unity in their diversity. **Individuality is preserved**,
- 66 for one branch cannot blend into another in the same stock; yet
- 67 every individual branch must be in fellowship with the other if
- 68 they are united to the parent stock. If they draw nourishment from
- 69 the same source they draw nourishment from the same spirit.
- 70 They drink in the same life-giving properties. Thus unity is
- 71 preserved, and there is love one for another. But this does not
- 72 make the branches an identity although it constitutes them
- 73 a unity, nor does this mean uniformity in everything.
- 74 Christian unity consists in the branches being in the same
- 75 parent stock, the vitalizing power of the Center supporting the
- 76 grafts that united to the Vine. Manuscript 66, 1897.26
- 77 "I am the true Vine," He says. **Instead of choosing the graceful**
- 78 palm, the lofty cedar, or the strong oak, Jesus takes the vine

- 79 with its clinging tendrils to represent Himself. The palm tree, the
- 80 cedar, and the oak stand alone. They require no support. But the vine
- 81 entwines about the trellis, and thus climbs heavenward. So **Christ in**
- 82 His humanity was dependent upon divine power. "I can of Mine
- 83 own self do nothing," He declared. John 5:30. Desire of Ages, p.
- 84 674.3
- 85 The root sends its nourishment through the branch to the outermost
- 86 twig. So Christ communicates the current of spiritual strength to
- 87 every believer. So long as the soul is united to Christ, there is no
- 88 danger that it will wither or decay. Desire of Ages, p. 676.3
- 89 A connection with Christ means everything to us. ... We are to be
- 90 attached to the parent stock, and to receive nourishment from the
- 91 Vine. Christ is our glorified Head, and the divine love flowing from
- 92 the heart of God, rests in Christ, and is communicated to those
- 93 who have been united to him. This divine love entering the soul
- 94 inspires it with gratitude, frees it from its spiritual feebleness, from
- 95 pride, vanity, and selfishness, and from all that would deform the
- 96 Christian character. Review and Herald, November 17, 1891, par. 9
- 97 This spiritual relation can be established only by the exercise of
- 98 personal faith. This faith must express on our part supreme
- 99 preference, perfect reliance, entire consecration. Our will must be
- 100 wholly yielded to the divine will, our feelings, desires, interests, and
- 101 honor identified with the prosperity of Christ's kingdom and the
- 102 honor of His cause, we constantly receiving grace from Him, and
- 103 Christ accepting gratitude from us. Testimonies for the Church, vol.
- 104 5, 229.2
- The life of the vine will be manifest in fragrant fruit on the branches.
- "He that abideth in Me," said Jesus, "and I in him, the same bringeth
- 107 forth much fruit: for without Me ye can do nothing." When we live
- by faith on the Son of God, the fruits of the Spirit will be seen in
- our lives; not one will be missing. Desire of Ages, p. 676.4
- 110 There is a wide difference between a pretended union and a real
- connection with Christ by faith. A profession of the truth places
- men in the church, but this does not prove that they have a vital
- connection with the living Vine. A rule is given by which the true
- disciple may be distinguished from those who claim to follow Christ
- but have not faith in Him. The one class are fruit bearing, the
- other, fruitless. The one are often subjected to the pruning knife of
- 117 God that they may bring forth more fruit; the other, as withered
- branches, are erelong to be severed from the living Vine. . . .

### B. Christ Our Head: United in the Church

- \*Ps. 133:1-3 "Behold how good and pleasant it is for brethren to
- dwell together in unity! It is like precious oil upon the head running
- down the beard, the beard of Aaron, running down on the edge of
- 127 his garments.... For there the Lord commanded the blessing...."
- \*Eph. 4:15,16"...but speaking the truth in love, may grow up in all
- 129 things into Him who is the head—Christ—from whom the whole
- 130 body, joined and knit together by what every joint supplies,
- 131 according to the effective working by which every part does its
- share, causes growth of the body for the edifying of itself in love."
- \*Eph. 4:30 "For we are members of His body, of His flesh and of
- 134 His bones."
- 135 1 Cor. 12:18 "But now God has set the members, each one of them,
- in the body just as He pleased."

- 138 Unity in Diversity in the Human Body
- •Every body part is needed (Every member is needed).
- •Every body part is important (Every member is valued).
- •Every body part has a specific role (Every member has specific
- 142 role.).
- •Every body part is connected (Every member is connected to
- 144 Christ).
- •Every body part depends on the blood (Every member partakes of a
- 146 common source of life).
- •Every body part depends on the heart (Every member depends on a
- 148 common power).
- •Every body part is sustained by food and oxygen coming from
- outside of itself (Every member depends on spiritual food coming
- 151 from outside of him or her).
- •Every body part obeys brain (Every member obeys Christ the head
- of the Church).
- •Physical health depends on the harmony of the body parts—often
- as part of a larger group (Spiritual and other success depends on the
- unity of the members).
- •The human body strongly responds to the pain of any entity of the
- body (A healthy spiritual body responds to the pain of the individual
- 159 members).

161 Christian unity is a mighty agency. It tells in a powerful manner that those who possess it are children of God. It has an 162 irresistible influence upon the world.... We are to be one with our 163 fellow-men and with Christ, and in Christ one with God. Then of us 164 can be spoken the words, "Ye are complete in Him." {ST February 165 166 7, 1900, par. 1} In the plan of redemption a place is allotted to every 167 soul. To each man is given his work. No one can be a member of Christ's body and yet be inactive. Different lines of work are 168 169 committed to different men, according to their several ability. The 170 work of God's people may and will be varied, but one Spirit is the mover in it all. All the work done for the Master is to 171 172 be connected with the great whole. The workers are to labor 173 together in concert, each one controlled by divine power, putting 174 forth undivided effort to draw those around them to Christ. All 175 must move like parts of well-adjusted machinery, each part dependent on the other part, yet standing distinct in action. And 176 177 each one is to take the place assigned him and do the work 178 appointed him. God calls upon the members of His church to receive 179 the Holy Spirit, to come together in unity and brotherly 180 sympathy, to bind their interests together in love. {ST February 7, 1900, par. 2} ... All jealousy, evil surmising, and evil speaking 181 are of him, and tend to produce discord and disunion. Then 182 shall God's people be at variance with one another? Shall they 183 184 not be cemented together by the Holy Spirit, each worker filled with love and sympathy for his fellow-worker, each filling his 185 186 appointment with faithful effort, seeking earnestly to prepare the way of the Lord? In the general discord there should be one place 187 188 where harmony and unity should exist because the Bible is the 189 guide. When the principles of God's Word are followed, it becomes 190 a bright light shining in a dark place. All who build on this Rock can 191 be sure that their house will stand amid the tempest. {ST February 7, 192 1900, par. 3} ... The Holy Spirit will work with the consecrated 193 human instrument; for this is God's purpose. ... When God's 194 people place themselves in proper relation to Him and to one 195 another, there will be a full impartation of the Holy Spirit for the 196 harmonious combination of the whole body. {ST February 7, 1900, par. 5} Nothing so manifestly weakens a church as disunion and 197 198 strife. Nothing so wars against Christ and the truth as this 199 spirit. Who is a wise man and endued with knowledge among you? let him show out of a good conversation his works with 200 meekness of wisdom." "Wherefore lift up the hands which hang 201 202 down, and the feeble knees; and make straight paths for your feet, 203 lest that which is lame be turned out of the way; but let it rather be 204 healed. Follow peace with all men, and holiness, without which

no man shall see the Lord; looking diligently lest any man fail of 205 206 the grace of God; lest any root of bitterness springing up trouble 207 you, and thereby many be defiled." (ST February 7, 1900, par. 6) 208 As long as we are in this world we must be linked with one 209 another. Humanity is interlaced and interwoven with humanity. 210 As Christians we are members of one another. ... In helplessness 211 and disappointment we are fighting the battles of life, and the 212 Lord designs us, as His sons and daughters, whom He calls His 213 friends, to help one another. This is to be a part of our practical Christian work. Who is my neighbor? Read and understand. {ST 214 215 February 7, 1900, par. 7} We can be united with one another only 216 as we are united with Christ. ... Our life should be bound up with 217 His life. We should draw constantly from Him, partaking of the 218 living bread which came down from heaven, drinking from a 219 fountain ever fresh, ever giving forth its abundant treasure. When 220 this is in truth the experience of the Christian, there is seen in 221 his life a freshness, a simplicity, a humility, a meekness and 222 lowliness of heart, that show all with whom he associates that he 223 has been with Jesus and learned of Him. {ST February 7, 1900, 224 par. 8} ... Truth, with its divine power and influence, takes 225 possession of us, making of believers one harmonious whole, of which Christ is seen to be the soul. Every element is working in 226 227 right lines. Every worker who fills his appointed place is helping to uplift the cross of Calvary. {ST February 7, 1900, par. 9} This is the 228 229 unity God requires in His service. When God's chosen people 230 are of one mind, barriers of selfishness will disappear as by 231 magic, and many, many more souls will be converted because of 232 the unity which exists among believers. There is one body and one 233 spirit. Those who have been building territorial lines of distinction, 234 barriers of color and caste, might better take these down much faster 235 than they put them up. {ST February 7, 1900, par. 10} He in whose 236 heart Christ abides recognizes Christ abiding in the heart of his 237 brother. Christ never wars against Christ. Christ never exerts 238 an influence against Christ. Christians are to do their work, 239 whatever it may be, in the unity of the Spirit, for the perfecting 240 of the whole body. The church is to be purified, refined, ennobled. 241 The members are to cast from their hearts the idols which have hindered their advancement in spirituality. By the influence of the 242 243 Spirit, the most discordant may be brought into harmony. Unselfishness is to bind God's people together with firm, tender 244 245 bonds. There is a vast power in the church when the energies of 246 the members are under the control of the Spirit, gathering good 247 from every source, educating, training, and disciplining self. 248 Thus is presented to God a powerful organization, through which He

- 249 can work for the conversion of sinners. Thus heaven and earth
- are connected, and all the divine agencies co-operate with human
- 251 instrumentalities. {ST February 7, 1900, par. 11}
- 252 (Christ) engages to come into the midst of his church, and to
- 253 honor their prayers and decision by the manifestation of his
- 254 grace and power. They are members of his mystical body. Christ
- expects that man will be partaker of his divine nature while in the
- 256 world, and thus convey a large amount of glory from earth to
- 257 heaven. Review and Herald, December 11, 1888
- 258 God hath His servants,—his church, established in the earth,
- composed of many members, but of one body; that in every part
- of the work one part must work as connected with another part,
- and that with another part, and with another part, and these are
- 262 joined together by the golden links of Heaven, and there are to
- 263 be no kings here in their midst at all. {Ms43c-1901.10}

# 266 C. Christ Our Example: United to Each Other

- 267 Col. 4:13 "But above all these things put on love, which is the bond
- 268 of perfection... called in one body."
- 269 \*1 John 2:10 "Whoever loves his brother lives in the light, and there
- 270 is nothing in him to make him stumble."

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- 272 What do we learn about unity from the relationship of Christ and
- 273 His Father?
- \*John 17:21 "...that they all may be one, as You, Father, are in Me,
- and I in You; that they also may be one in Us, that the world may
- 276 believe that You sent Me."

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- 279 \*Unity in diversity among God's children—the manifestation of
- 280 love and forbearance in spite of differences of disposition—this
- 281 is the testimony that God sent His son into the world to save
- sinners. This unity is the most convincing proof to the world of
- 283 the majesty and virtue of Christ. Sons and Daughters of God, p.
- 284 286
- 285 True religion unites hearts, not only with Christ, but with one
- another, in a most tender union. When we know what it means to
- 287 be thus united with Christ, and with our brethren, a fragrant
- influence will attend our work wherever we go. Gospel Workers, p.
- 289 483

290 \*As living branches of the True Vine, all will be united to Christ, the living head. Christ will abide in every heart, guiding, 291 292 comforting, sanctifying, and presenting to the world the unity of 293 the followers of Jesus, thus bearing testimony that the heavenly 294 credentials are supplied to the remnant church. In the oneness of 295 Christ's church it will be proven that God sent His only-begotten Son into the world.... Satan is determined that...oneness shall not 296 297 be; for it is the strongest witness that can be borne that God 298 gave his Son to reconcile the world to heaven. But the union for 299 which Christ prayed must exist among God's people before he can bestow on the church the enlargement and power that he 300 301 longs to bestow on it. \*When the laborers have an abiding Christ in their own souls, when all selfishness is dead, when there is no rivalry, no strife for the supremacy, when oneness exists, when they sanctify themselves, so that love for one another is seen and felt, then the showers of the grace of the Holy Spirit will just as surely come upon them as that God's promise will never fail in one jot or tittle. But when the work of others is discounted, that the workers may show their own superiority, they prove that their own work does not bear the signature it should. God cannot bless them. 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### What do we learn about unity in the early church?

- Acts 2:1 "When the Day of Pentecost had fully come, they were all with one accord in one place."
- 316 What was the result of the outpouring of the Spirit on the Day of
- 317 Pentecost? The glad tidings of a risen Saviour were carried to the
- 318 uttermost parts of the inhabited world. As the disciples
- 319 proclaimed the message of redeeming grace, hearts yielded to the
- 320 power of this message. The church beheld converts flocking to
- 321 her from all directions. Backsliders were reconverted. Sinners
- 322 united with believers in seeking the pearl of great price. Some who
- 323 had been the bitterest opponents of the gospel became its
- 324 champions. ... Every Christian saw in his brother a revelation of
- 325 divine love and benevolence. One interest prevailed; one subject of
- 326 emulation swallowed up all others. The **ambition of the believers**
- 327 was to reveal the likeness of Christ's character and to labor for
- the enlargement of His kingdom. Acts of the Apostles, p. 48.1
- 329 The differences that now exist among Christians did not exist in
- 330 the days of Christ or His apostles. When the gospel was
- 331 preached after the resurrection and ascension of Christ, union
- prevailed; the believers were all of one heart and one mind. ...

- 333 Through the divine illumination and sanctification of the Spirit the
- believers were perfectly joined together in the same mind and in the
- 335 same judgment. This was and always will be the fruit that is
- 336 borne under the influence of the Holy Spirit. Manuscript
- 337 *Releases*, vol. 14, p. 176.2
- After the descent of the Holy Spirit, when the disciples went forth to
- 339 proclaim a living Saviour, their one desire was the salvation of
- 340 souls. They rejoiced in the sweetness of communion with saints.

- 347 What is the result of unity?

- When God's chosen people are of one mind, barriers of selfishness

- 356 When we bring our hearts into unity with Christ, and our lives
- 357 into harmony with His work, the Spirit that fell on the disciples

- 360 Is Christ divided?—No. Christ abiding in the soul will not quarrel
- 361 with Christ in another soul. We must learn to bear with the
- 362 peculiarities of those around us. If our will is under the control of

- 364 at variance, we may know that it is because self needs to be
- 365 crucified. He whom Christ makes free is free indeed. We are not
- 366 complete in Christ unless we love one another as Christ has loved

### 385 But discord gradually came. It continues in our day!

- 386 James 3:16 "For where envy and self-seeking exist, confusion and
- 387 every evil thing are there."
- 388 James 4:1 "Where do wars and fights come from among you? Do
- 389 they not come from your desires for pleasure that war in your
- 390 members? You lust and do not have. You murder and covet and
- 391 cannot obtain. You fight and war. Yet you do not have because you
- 392 do not ask."

- 394 Gradually a change came. The believers began to look for
- 395 defects in others. Dwelling upon mistakes, giving place to unkind
- 396 criticism, they lost sight of the Saviour and His love. They
- 397 became more strict in regard to outward ceremonies, more
- 398 particular about the theory than the practice of the faith. In their
- 399 zeal to condemn others, they overlooked their own errors. They
- 400 lost the brotherly love that Christ had enjoined, and, saddest of all,
- 401 they were unconscious of their loss. They did not realize that
- 402 happiness and joy were going out of their lives and that, having shut
- 403 the love of God out of their hearts, they would soon walk in
- 404 darkness. Acts of the Apostles, p. 548.1
- \*The cause of division and discord in families and in the church is
- 406 separation from Christ. To come near to Christ is to come near to
- 407 one another. The secret of true unity in the church and in the family
- 408 is not diplomacy, not management, not a superhuman effort to
- 409 overcome difficulties—though there will be much of this to do—but
- 410 union with Christ. Adventist Home, p. 179
- 411 The cause of divisions or discord in the church is separation from
- 412 Christ. The secret of unity is union with Christ. Christ is the great
- 413 center. We shall approach one another just in proportion as we
- 414 approach the center. United with Christ, we shall surely be united
- 415 with our brethren in the faith. *Paulsen Collection*, p. 153

- 417 What are the consequences of disunity?
- 418 A sleepy, Christless church, quarreling and surmising evil, will
- 419 have no reward, and need look for no revival, unless its members
- 420 **repent,** and do the first works. Review and Herald, June 26, 1888
- 421 Par. 9}
- 422 Many who profess to gather with Christ are scattering from
- 423 Him. This is why the church is so weak. Many indulge freely in
- 424 criticism and accusing. By giving expression to suspicion,
- 425 jealousy, and discontent, they yield themselves as instruments to
- 426 Satan. Before they realize what they are doing, the adversary has
- 427 through them accomplished his purpose. The impression of evil has
- 428 been made, the shadow has been cast, the arrows of Satan have
- 429 found their mark. Distrust, unbelief, and downright infidelity
- 430 have fastened upon those who otherwise might have accepted
- 431 Christ. Meanwhile the workers for Satan look complacently
- 432 upon those whom they have driven to skepticism, and who are
- 433 now hardened against reproof and entreaty. They flatter
- 434 themselves that in comparison with these souls they are virtuous
- 435 and righteous. They do not realize that these sad wrecks of
- 436 character are the work of their own unbridled tongues and
- 437 rebellious hearts. It is through their influence that these tempted
- ones have fallen. *Christ Object Lessons*, p. 340.3
- 439 There is no more effectual hindrance to growth in grace than this
- 440 disposition to criticize and condemn others. We have in our
- 441 experience seen this accusing spirit gradually enter the hearts of
- church-members until it had leavened nearly the entire church,
- and the result was that little of real godliness or of the spirit of
- 444 Christ remained.--HS 212, 213. Pastoral Ministry, p. 268.3
- Envy, evil surmising, backbiting, and faultfinding,--let these not
- be named among Christ's disciples. These things are the cause of
- 447 **the present feebleness of the church**. We have a perfect Pattern,
- even the life of Christ. It is to be our eager desire to do as he has
- done, to live as he lived, that others, by seeing our good works, may
- 450 be led to glorify God. *Review and Herald*, May 10, 1906 par. 13
- 451 One great reason why our brethren and sisters have no more

- whose tongues are set on fire of hell. If you stop to dispute, you
- 649 **will but open the way for further abuse.** Often difficulties may be
- 650 healed by silence. Let the evil talker alone. Go about your own work
- as one who has a sacred trust to fulfil. When you are criticised,
- 652 move on as one who hears not. Your heart may be wounded:
- 653 nevertheless, do not allow yourself to be turned aside from your

- 828 alike. Each has its own individuality, which cannot be merged
- 829 into that of another, but all have a special connection with each

- 832 alike on the vine for sustenance; all must be joined to the parent
- 833 stalk. The life and growth and fruitfulness of each depend alike on

- 835 hold of the true vine makes them one; in their diversity there is

- The lesson of the vine and its branches holds a deep meaning for the
- workers in the cause of God. Every worker is to draw his strength

from the same source; and while the individuality of each is to 839 be maintained, unity and harmony is to be preserved. When this 840 841 spirit of oneness pervades the work, our institutions throughout the world will be united in their interests, while the individuality 842 843 of any one will not be merged into that of any other one. Letter 112, 1907.14 844 845 The branches of the vine cannot blend into each other; they are individually separate; yet every branch must be in fellowship 846 847 with every other if they are united in the same parent stock. They all draw nourishment from the same source; they drink in the 848 849 same life-giving properties. So each branch of the True Vine is separate and distinct, yet all are bound together in the parent 850 851 stock. There can be no division. They are all linked together by his will to bear fruit wherever they can find place and 852 853 opportunity. But in order to do this, the worker must hide self. He must not give expression to his own mind and will. He is to 854 855 express the mind and will of Christ. The human family are 856 dependent upon God for life and breath and sustenance. God has 857 designed the web, and all are individual threads to compose the 858 pattern. The Creator is one, and he reveals himself as the great 859 Reservoir of all that is essential for each separate life.
