

501 the objectionable duties in a spirit of submission and helpfulness. They are
502 being qualified to fill places where their disciplined abilities will make them
503 of the greatest service.

504 Some God trains by bringing to them disappointment and apparent failure. It is
505 His purpose that they shall learn to master difficulty. He inspires them with a
506 determination to make every apparent failure prove a success.

507 Often men pray and weep because of the perplexities and obstacles that
508 confront them. But if they will hold the beginning of their confidence steadfast
509 unto the end, He will make their way clear. Success will come to them as they
510 struggle against apparently insurmountable difficulties; and with success will
511 come the greatest joy.

512 Many are ignorant of how to work for God, not because they need to be
513 ignorant, but because they are not willing to submit to His training process.

514 Moab is spoken of as a failure because, the Word declares, he "hath been at
515 ease from his youth, . . . and hath not been emptied from vessel to vessel,
516 therefore his taste remained in him, and his scent is not changed." (Jeremiah
517 48:11.)

518 Thus it is with those whose hereditary and cultivated tendencies to wrong are
519 not purged from them. Their hearts are not cleansed from defilement. They
520 were given opportunity to do a work for God, but this work they did not
521 choose to do, because they wished to carry out their own plans.

522 The Christian is to be prepared for the doing of a work that reveals kindness,
523 forbearance, longsuffering, gentleness, patience. The cultivation of these
524 precious gifts is to come into the discipline-life of the Christian, that when
525 called to service by the Master, he may be ready to exercise the energies of
526 heart and mind in helping and blessing those who are ready to die.—Ms 79,
527 1903, pp. 1-3. ("How God Trains His Workers," August 4, 1903.)—

3 Learning how to determine God's will is one of the more important lessons in
4 obtaining answers to prayer and knowing God's blessings in the Christian life.
5 The following Scriptures and thoughts should be helpful in seeking
6 to understand this subject.

7 8 9 GOD'S WILL AND PRAYER

11 1 John 5:14,15 "And this is the confidence that we have in him, that, if we ask
12 any thing according to his will, he heareth us: And if we know that he hear us,
13 whatsoever we ask, we know that we have the petitions that we desired of
14 him."

15
16 1 John 3:22 "And whatsoever we ask, we receive of him, because we keep his
17 commandments, and do those things that are pleasing in his sight."

18
19 "He makes it plain that our asking must be according to God's will; we must
20 ask for the things that He has promised, and whatever we receive must be used
21 in doing His will. The conditions met, the promise is unequivocal." *Education*,
22 p. 257.7

23
24 "When we pray for earthly blessings, the answer to our prayer may be
25 delayed, or God may give us something other than we ask, but not so when we
26 ask for deliverance from sin. It is His will to cleanse us from sin, to make us
27 His children, and to enable us to live a holy life." *Desire of Ages*, p. 266.2

32 1. God wants His will to be perfectly accomplished in our lives:

34 Colossians 4:12 "That ye may stand perfect and complete in all the will
35 of God."

37 2. Jesus always sought to do His Father's will:

43 3. God is willing to give wisdom:

78 6. God will never lead contrary to what is taught in the Bible:

80 Isaiah 8:20: "To the law and to the testimony! If they do not
81 speak according to this word, it is because there is no light in them."

456 "All who have determined to serve God will seek to know and to do his will,
457 at whatever cost to themselves. The true servants of God will be made
458 manifest by their willing obedience to all the commandments of their Master.
459 They will not be murmuring and finding fault with the law, but will declare by
460 word and action, "This is the love of God, that we keep his commandments;
461 and his commandments are not grievous." In obeying the law, they are doing
462 that which is well-pleasing in the sight of Heaven, and all the promises of the
463 word of God are pledged to the support of the faithful and obedient. They may
464 hope in his mercy, build on his immutable counsels, obtain the desires of their
465 hearts, because their wills are placed on the side of God's will. It is their meat
466 to do the will of God and to finish his work. The gates of the eternal city shall
467 open for the nation that has kept the truth. The servants of God shall eat of the
468 tree of life, and enjoy the unsearchable riches of eternity."—*Signs of the*

471 *We Must Accept God's Training Experiences*
472 "Christ has given to every man his work, and we are to acknowledge the
473 wisdom of the plan He has made for us by a hearty cooperation with Him. It is
474 in a life of service only that true happiness is found. He who lives a useless,
475 selfish life is miserable. He is dissatisfied with himself and with everyone else.
476 True, unselfish, consecrated workers gladly use their highest gifts in the
477 lowliest service. They realize that true service means to see and to perform the
478 duties that God points out.
479 There are many who are not satisfied with the work that God has given them.
480 They are not satisfied to serve Him pleasantly in the place that He has marked
481 out for them, or to do uncomplainingly the work that He has placed in their
482 hands.
483 It is right for us to be dissatisfied with the way in which we perform duty, but
484 we are not to be dissatisfied with the duty itself, because we would rather do
485 something else. In His providence God places before human beings service
486 that will be as medicine to their diseased minds. Thus He seeks to lead them to
487 put aside the selfish preferences which, if cherished, would disqualify them for
488 the work He has for them. If they accept and perform this service, their minds
489 will be cured. But if they refuse it, they will be left at strife with themselves
490 and with others.
491 The Lord disciplines His workers, so that they will be prepared to fill the
492 places appointed them. He desires to mold their minds in accordance with His
493 will. For this purpose He brings to them test and trial. Some He places where
494 relaxed discipline and over-indulgence will not become their snare, where they
495 are taught to appreciate the value of time, and to make the best and wisest use
496 of it.
497 There are some who desire to be a ruling power, and who need the
498 sanctification of submission. God brings about a change in their lives, and
499 perhaps places before them duties that they would not choose. If they are
500 willing to be guided by Him, He will give them grace and strength to perform

407 with success. Those who know how to pray, who know what are the
408 invitations of the gospel of Christ, show dishonor to God when they lay their
409 burdens upon finite men. It is always right to counsel together; it is right to
410 converse together; it is right to make the difficulties that present themselves in
411 any enterprise plain before your brethren and your ministers. But do not
412 depend upon man for wisdom. Seek God for the wisdom that comes from
413 above. Ask your fellow laborers to pray with you; and the Lord will fulfill his
414 word, "Where two or three are gathered together in my name, there am I in the
415 midst." —*Youth Instructor*, February 15, 1900

417 *We Must Accept His Direction*

418 "It is in neglecting to follow the exact directions of the word of God that many
419 err. They turn away from God's plans, to follow their own ideas. Christ
420 himself declared, "The Son of Man can do nothing of himself, but what he
421 seeth the Father do; for what things soever he doeth, these also doeth the Son
422 likewise." So utterly was he emptied of self that he made no plans for himself.
423 He accepted God's plan for him, and day by day the Father unfolded his plans.
424 If Jesus was so wholly dependent, declaring, "I do nothing of myself," how
425 much more should the human agents depend upon God for constant
426 instruction, so that their lives might be the simple working out of God's will.
427 Oh, that failing, erring mortals would be content to seek wisdom from God,
428 and be entirely submissive in working out his directions, in exemplifying his
429 character! If ever mortals needed to send to heaven an earnest cry, "Lord,
430 show me thy way; teach me the way of the Lord," it is now. Only those will
431 have a fitness for the mansions above who give to God full and implicit
432 obedience. God knows that we would not appreciate his rarest gifts if we were
433 not perfectly submissive to his will."—*Signs of the Times*, November 21, 1892
434 par. 2

435

436 "We must not study to have our own way, but God's way and God's will. . . .
437 Human beings suffer much because they step out of the path that God has
438 chosen for them to follow. They walk in the sparks of the fire they themselves
439 have kindled, and the sure result is affliction, unrest, and sorrow, which they
440 might have avoided if they had submitted their will to God. . . . Whatever path
441 God chooses for us, whatever way He ordains for our feet, that is the only path
442 of safety. . . . With the eye of faith, with childlike submission as obedient

83 7. God will providentially direct us by opening and closing doors:

85 Proverbs 3:6: "In all your ways acknowledge Him, and He will
86 direct your paths."

88 8. We may not understand all the steps, but God will both prepare and direct
89 us for whatever He has in mind—like He did for Daniel who didn't always
90 understand what was going on:

91

92 2 Sam. 22:33 "God is my strength and power, and He makes my way
93 perfect."

94

95 Heb. 13:20-21 "Now may the God of peace who brought up our Lord
96 Jesus from the dead, that great Shepherd of the sheep, through the blood
97 of the everlasting covenant, 21 make you complete in every good work
98 to do His will, working in you what is well pleasing in His sight, through
99 Jesus Christ, to whom be glory forever and ever. Amen."

100

101 9. When God is leading, His peace will rule in our hearts. Lack of peace is an
102 important indicator that what we are pursuing may not be God's will, or that it
103 is not yet God's time:

104

105 Col. 3:15: "And let the peace of God rule in your hearts, to which also
106 you were called in one body; and be thankful."

107

108 10. It is often wise to share God's leadings with a mature and surrendered
109 Christian, to ascertain if we are correctly understanding God's leading:

110

111 Proverbs 11:14 "In the multitude of counselors there is safety."

112

113 11. As God leads us forward He often only shows us one step at a time.

114

115 Isa. 30:21 "Your ears shall hear a word behind you, saying, 'This is the
116 way, walk in it, whenever you turn to the right hand whenever you turn
117 to the left.'"

118

119 12. Confirmation—NOT direction—is sometimes gained in seeking a fleece.

120

121 "Look, I shall put a fleece of wool on the threshing floor; if there is dew
122 on the fleece only, and it is dry on all the ground, then I shall know that
123 You will save Israel by my hand, as You have said." Judges 6:37

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God Reveals His Will Three Ways

“There are three ways in which the Lord reveals His will to us, to guide us, and to fit us to guide others. How may we know His voice from that of a stranger? How shall we distinguish it from the voice of a false shepherd? God reveals His will to us in His word, the Holy Scriptures. His voice is also revealed in His providential workings; and it will be recognized if we do not separate our souls from Him by walking in our own ways, doing according to our own wills, and following the promptings of an unsanctified heart, until the senses have become so confused that eternal things are not discerned, and the voice of Satan is so disguised that it is accepted as the voice of God.

Another way in which God’s voice is heard is through the appeals of His Holy Spirit, making impressions upon the heart, which will be wrought out in the character. If you are in doubt upon any subject you must first consult the Scriptures. If you have truly begun the life of faith you have given yourself to the Lord to be wholly His, and He has taken you to mold and fashion according to His purpose, that you may be a vessel unto honor. You should have an earnest desire to be pliable in His hands and to follow whithersoever He may lead you. You are then trusting Him to work out His designs, while at the same time you are co-operating with Him by working out your own salvation with fear and trembling. You, my brother, will find difficulty here because you have not yet learned by experience to know the voice of the Good Shepherd, and this places you in doubt and peril. You ought to be able to distinguish His voice.”—*Testimonies* Vol. 5, p. 512.1,2

You Must Trust God

“Many who profess to be Christ’s followers have an anxious, troubled heart, because they are afraid to trust themselves with God. They do not make a complete surrender to Him; for they shrink from the consequences that such a surrender may involve. Unless they do make this surrender, they cannot find peace.... Worry is blind, and cannot discern the future; but Jesus sees the end from the beginning. In every difficulty He has His way prepared to bring relief. ‘No good thing will He withhold from them that walk uprightly.’ Our heavenly Father has a thousand ways to provide for us of which we know nothing. 386 “God would have you united in pleasant cords of companionship. As the
387 Lord's workmen, you are to open your plans one to another. These plans must
388 be carefully and prayerfully considered, for the Lord will leave those who do

390 [John 15:16, 17, quoted.]
391 One person must not suppose that his wisdom is beyond making any mistake.
392 God would have the greatest cherish that humility that will lead him to be the

331 "In all our dealings with one another, God desires us carefully to guard the
332 principle of personal responsibility to and dependence upon Him."—*Loma*

334
335 “If we are to be co-laborers with God, we must hold direct communion with
336 Him: we must ask His guidance in everything we undertake. We cannot
337 commit to another the explanation, or ask them to direct us. But how few
338 know what it is to hold intercourse with God. How readily some place the
339 responsibility of their duty on others, and ask them to tell them what to do. We
340 say to all such, You must know your duty from God. Many have depended on
341 their fellow-men until they have no individual experience. They are towed
342 along as a barge by a steamer.

343 All must see and understand their duty for themselves, after seeking wisdom
344 from God. He is the only one to whom you may commit your soul for safe-
345 keeping. If you come to Him in faith, he will speak His mysteries to you

241 will often burn within us as One draws nigh to commune with us as He did
242 with Enoch. Those who decide to do nothing in any line that will displease
243 God, will know, after presenting their case before Him, just what course to
244 pursue. And they will receive not only wisdom, but strength. Power for
245 obedience, for service, will be imparted to them, as Christ has promised.
246 Whatever was given to Christ--the "all things" to supply the need of fallen
247 men--was given to Him as the head and representative of humanity. And
248 'whatsoever we ask, we receive of Him, because we keep His commandments,
249 and do those things that are pleasing in His sight.'" 1 John 3:22."—*Desire of

252 "Those who turn away from the light which God has given, or who neglect to

262 *Obeying God Regarding Employment Contracts*

264 "Human beings belong to the Lord, body, soul, and spirit, and they are to be
265 guided and controlled by him. He has bought us. We are under obligation to

266 be laborers together with him. No one should bind himself to serve for a
267 certain number of years in any institution.

268
269 I know that some have thought it advisable for the workers in our sanitariums
270 to sign certain contracts. But I know also that it is not in accordance with
271 God's plan for the workers to sign these contracts. They are pledged to God,
272 and if he moves upon them to take the message to a certain place, shall they be
273 bound by a pledge that hinders them from going? Never, never, We are not
274 our own, and we are not to bind ourselves to human beings by signing
275 contracts to do this or that. We are to work under our Master, Christ Jesus,
276 looking to him for directions. We are to pray and work and believe, following
277 always the course that he marks out."—*Spaulding Magan Collection*, p. 307.4

278 *Be Exact In Following Divine Arrangements With Tithe*

279
280 "You may say, I have not large means and can do but little with the little I
281 have. All the Lord asks of you is to be a faithful steward, to render to God a
282 tenth of all your increase without stopping to measure the matter to see how
283 you are coming out. You have but little means, render back to him the portion
284 belonging to him; for it is not yours. It is a serious matter to rob God. Thus
285 you deprive yourself of the blessing he has promised to bestow if you exercise
286 faithful stewardship. If you have been untrue to God, if you show that you will
287 not do according to the agreement he has made with you, will he bless you
288 with facilities of obtaining more means? You keep yourself under
289 condemnation as unfaithful stewards by working contrary to a "Thus saith the
290 Lord." You deprive the treasury of God of your proportion of his agreement
291 with you, because you choose to walk in the light of the sparks of your own
292 kindling. In your finite wisdom, you think you are making better terms with
293 yourself than God has made with you. How then, if you are unfaithful steward
294 with the least, can the Lord entrust to you larger responsibilities?

295
296 God wants all his stewards to be exact in following divine arrangements. They
297 are not to offset the Lord's plans with some deed of charity, some gift, or some
298 offering, done or given when and how, the human agents, shall see fit. God
299 has made his plan known, and all who co-operate with him will carry out his
300 plan, instead of daring to attempt to improve on it, by their own arrangements.
301 Those who honor a "Thus saith the Lord," who accept exactly what the Lord
302 has devised, will be according to God's plan. God will honor them, and work
303 in their behalf. For we have his pledged word that he will open the windows of
304 heaven and pour us out a blessing, such as there will not be room enough to
305 receive.

306
307 It is a very poor policy for men to seek to improve on God's plan, and invent a
308 makeshift, averaging up their good impulses in this and that instance, and
309 offsetting them against all that is required of God. God calls upon you to give
310 every jot of influence to his own arrangement and ordinances. We are to strike
311 true and faithful figures in tithing and then say to the Lord, I have done as thou
312 hast commanded me. If you will honor me by trusting me with thy goods to
